

Remembering **Stephen Tyrone Johns**



The FOP and NLEOMF extends its deepest sympathies to the family members, friends and colleagues of Stephen Tyrone Johns for his tremendous display of heroic sacrifice vesterday inside the hallowed grounds of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum.

Mr. Johns-"Big John" to many, for his large stature and friendly demeanor-was a special police officer employed by Wackenhut Services who provided security at the Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC, for the past six years. Yesterday, shortly before 1 pm, Mr. Johns was gunned down at the entrance to the museum by an 88-year-old, avowed white supremacist armed with a rifle.

"Upon entering the front doors of the museum, he raised the rifle and

started shooting," DC Metropolitan Police Chief Cathy Lanier told reporters. Before he could draw his own weapon, Mr. Johns was struck by a bullet and died a short time later at nearby George Washington Hospital. Other security personnel immediately engaged the gunman, striking him down and courageously preventing others from being injured. He was admitted to the hospital in critical condition and has

been charged with the murder of Mr. Johns.

Describing Mr. Johns as "a wonderful individual ... a truly jovial human being," Holocaust Memorial Museum Director Sara Bloomfield said he "died heroically in the line of duty." Flags at the museum were lowered to half staff, and security officers wore black mourning bands across their badges.

The Museum, located just off the National Mall in southwest DC, has special meaning for the law enforcement community. Back in 1999, then Metropolitan Police Chief (and now Philadelphia Police Commissioner) Charles Ramsey joined with the Holocaust Memorial Museum and the Anti-Defamation League to launch a training program called "Law Enforcement and Society." That program uses the museum and the Holocaust as a "learning laboratory" for exploring law enforcement's unique role in our free and democratic society. Every MPD recruit and experienced officer goes through the program, and it has been expanded to several suburban and federal agencies, including the FBI.

As a result, the vast majority of officers who responded to yesterday's tragedy-Chief Lanier among them-had not only visited the Holocaust Memorial Museum, but had trained there and understood its significance to the community. Ms. Bloomfield put the incident into a broader context: "This speaks so powerfully to the mission of the museum, which is that hate is still with us, and this is why the museum exists."

Hello from your agency trustee, Michael Walsh. It has been a busy time dealing with multiple issues and grievances. If you have any questions or comments please feel free to contact me at 7036755345. Otherwise, I look forward to seeing you next month.

INFORMAL GRIEVANCES

The Union has submitted twenty (20) requests to negotiate changes in working conditions. All have been scheduled with the agency to meet. The most current issue was to meet on the Physical Fitness Improvement Program (PFIP) which is formally referred to as Administrative Memorandum 38. It is my sad duty to also announce that the Union had to reply to one (1) proposed removal but no decision has been received.

FORMAL GRIEVANCES

The Union has initiated four (4) grievances on Letter of Reprimand. The Union has initiated three (3) grievances on Security Breech. Please note it is the intention of the Agency to established new standards outside of Administrative Instruction Number 8. These standards apply to all personnel that alleged violate offense such as tardiness, security breaches, traffic accident, etc. Many of these standards are not defined and the issue is a negotiated area which is pending. The union has initiated four (4) grievances on suspension. Please note until negotiation is finalized suspension are based upon calendar day not work day or work hour. The union is initiating a grievance concerning performance appraisal rating cycle from 1 April 2008 to 31 March 2009 and the grievance is due by 10 June 2009.

ARBITRATIONS

Arbitrations have been divided into three categories: Pre Lawsuit, Post Lawsuit, and Current. There are approximately twenty (20) arbitrations from suspension to one removal. The removal arbitration is high priority since it involves employee's due

process rights. There are six (6) arbitrations in post lawsuit and one high priority concerning medical review board issue. The following are current arbitration two (2) Letter of Reprimand, one (1) promotion, two (2) suspensions, and one (1) removal and one (1) restored leave while on administrative leave.

LEGAL NEWS

FAA and TSA enforced firearm while on a commercial airline as outlined in 49 CFR. We (employee employed by PFPA) DO NOT fall under any of the exceptions listed in the regulation. Thus, we ARE NOT allowed to have a weapon onboard a commercial airline. However, we (as a citizen) can declare personal weapons in check baggage in accordance with the commercial airline you are flying with. LEOSA of 2004 (HR 218) applies to waiver of concealed weapon permit in all states and territories except on commercial airline.

MEDICAL NEWS

Per 5 CFR 339, the employer has a management right to establish medical and fitness standards. Per 5 use 71 the Union has a right to negotiate implementation and impact is-

sues that affect bargaining unit members concerns in medical and fitness standards. Bargaining unit members all defined as all police officers not assigned in supervisor or management position. The Union continues to negotiate and fight everyday on medical examination and physical fitness program. Per 5 CFR 339, medical examinations are fitness for duty examination. As such fitness for duty examination is initiated by observations by immediate supervisor and investigated by Human Resource Department based upon medical standards and your position descriptions.

Per 5 CFR 339, once an examination has been ordered, the employee has a choice. The employee can use the doctor the Agency provides or the employee can use personal physician. There are exceptions to this regulation when an employee initiated family medical leave act (FMLA) or injury on the job (DOLfOWCP).

SECURITY CLEARANCE

As outlined in DODDIR 5200.2, a clearance is required for a sensitive position and that employee has a need to access classified information. Based upon recent personal testimony by many officers and supervisors in FLRA hearing, not one officer stated a need to access classified information. Security Clearance issue is being used by the Agency in an attempt to justify that we (EMPLOYEES) are related to national security and thus are exempt from having a collective bargaining agreement. As yet, the FLRA has not close the record and no decision has been made. The Union anticipates a decision in December 2009 or January 2010. We also anticipate that regardless of the decision, one of the parties will appeal to the FLRA Board.

TRAINING

There are two forms of training the Department of Defense offers. One form is by DOD education office though college courses. The other form is submitting training request based upon performance elements and position description and career development to the agency's training division. Both are based upon budget restrictions.

ANNOUCEMENTS/EVENTS

As we approach the summer and Independence Day, be advice that our scheduled work hours may need to be adjusted or modified due to scheduled events occurring on the reservation. However, management is required to provide a fourteen (14) calendar day advance notice prior to any changes in working conditions. This requirement can be waived but a written waiver must be signed by the employee, employer, and the union.

▼ ummer is upon us. The members of the Executive Board of your FOPDOC Union wish all our membership a happy, healthful, summer vacation. Unfortunately there are many of our co-workers either facing termination, or already terminated. At no time in the history of the DC Department of Corrections have terminations been higher. Director Brown's obsession with his interpretation of the public's confidence in Corrections has led to the creation of an atmosphere at the DC Jail straight out of George Orwell's novel - 1984! Every move front line Officers and Staff makes is watched, big brother style, and where they feel needed, questioned. Executive Management is concocting memos and program statements in vague doublespeak. These signed for issuances are designed to divert blame from structural and procedural deficiencies and onto the poor beleaguered Corrections Officer and Staff. Meanwhile City activists, unfazed by a Director and Mayor who also assail the front line staff, are foisting one social experiment after another on the Jails over stretched security staff. Shortly we will become the first co-ed incarcerating facility in America! Trans Gendered inmates get to choose (Male or Female) their housing via sexual preference!

We are admired for our potential dangerous daily trek into harm's way. We truly walk the toughest beat in town. Sadly our greatest threat to job security comes from our very own Executive Management and City Officials who second guess and Monday morning quarterback our every move. This is truly tragic and unnecessary. Officers and Staff are urged to register their lack of confidence in Corrections Executive Managers. Don't complain if you do not have the courage to loudly sign-up for change.

The Professional Men and Women who patrol the tiers of the DC Jail will continue to provide the citizens of Washington DC and this region with top notch accredited service. Public Safety is our number one priority and we vow to provide security despite the misplaced stress brought on us by our Up-Town Executive Managers and the Mayor.

Provision in House Defense Authorization Bill Could Kill NSPS

huck Canterbury, National President of the Fraternal Order of Police, is optimistic that a provision in H.R. 2647, the "National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2010," which would curtail the expansion of and eventually rollback the National Security Personnel System, will pass the House and become law.

"We have been fighting NSPS since 2003," Canterbury said. "This employee management scheme, which has a pay-for-performance system based on subjective criteria, is inconsistent with the mission of law enforcement officers and better suited for door-to-door salesman."

Since the NSPS was passed into law in 2003, the FOP has been fighting the implementation because the system does not work for law enforcement. The NSPS sought to eliminate the General Schedule System and replace it with a pay-for-performance system for law enforcement officers within the Department of Defense (DoD). The system also entailed a reduction in the collective bargaining rights of our officers on issues such as overtime, flextime, and transfers by empowering the Secretary of Defense to remove any subject from the bargaining table. The FOP scored a victory in 2007 when the "National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008," restored collective bargaining rights, but the troubling pay-for-performance aspect remained.

"I am pleased that the language was included in the bill," Canterbury said. "But we need to fight to keep this provision in the Defense Authorization as the legislative process moves forward."

The provision, which passed as an amendment sponsored by Representative Carol Shea-Porter (D-NH) by voice vote in the House Armed Services Committee, would prohibit new hires from being put into the NSPS and would prevent any further reclassification of positions to NSPS. Additionally, it would convert all employees back to the General Schedule system within one year of enactment, unless the Secretary of Defense notifies Congress of significant changes to NSPS.

"When this provision becomes law it will not only be a victory for law enforcement officers within the DoD, but all Federal officers," Canterbury said. "Congress has sent a message that any attempt to reform Federal law enforcement shall not include any pay-for-performance system."

FOP and eBay Strike Deal on Sale of FOP Items

Thuck Canterbury, National President of the Fraternal Order of Police, announced that eBay, Inc. has finally agreed to prohibit the sale of certain items I bearing the FOP insignia.

"Obviously, I am very pleased that we were able to work with eBay officials to change company policy with respect to the sale of the FOP's items," Canterbury said. "Once they understood and recognized the dangers officers might face if they were deceived by an FOP badge or member identifier, they acted swiftly and in good faith to make the changes we requested."

The FOP adopted a resolution at its 58th National Biennial Conference in Louisville, Kentucky, calling for eBay to halt sales of items bearing the FOP insignia and other police identifiers. In its initial contact with eBay, the FOP pointed out the public safety risks of allowing non-law enforcement personnel to access such items, but the company allowed the sales to continue. Further dialogue with the online vendor led to a more productive engagement, culminating in an official change of policy which became effective on Friday, 5 June.

"I am very pleased with both the outcome and with eBay's willingness to work directly with us," Canterbury said. "They really came through and demonstrated that

This legislation amends "the Law Enforcement Pay Equity Act of 2000 to permit certain annuitants of the retirement programs of the United States Park Police and United States Secret Service Uniformed Division to receive the adjustments in pension benefits to which such annuitants would otherwise be entitled as a result of the conversion of members of the United States Park Police and United States Secret Service Uniformed Division to a new salary schedule under the amendments made by such Act".

Equipment

You don't have to invest thousands of dollars in equipment for the home. For \$200.00 to \$400.00, you can purchase all the necessary items. Arrange space in your basement, garage or just a 6'x 6' section of any room. Here are some of the practical items:

Weight Lifting

There are 12 Major Muscle Groups you should exercise for an effective "total body"



The number of repetitions should be 15-18, & each rep. should take 4-6 seconds (not 2 seconds like many do incorrectly). The number of sets you want to aim for over time is 3 sets of an exercise, and please rest 30 to 45 seconds between sets. How much weight should you be lifting both men and women? That's easy, your muscle should

start burning (muscle fatigue) around the last 3-4 reps. If, you don't feel a burn, the weight is too light, if the burn occurs too early, then the weight is too heavy. Pay attention to the "burn" rather than how much weight you are lifting, and this also prepares you to exercise anywhere on any equipment.

What is Injustice?

ebster's Dictionary defines injustice as a violation of a person's rights, unfairness or an unjust act or deed.

✔ ✔ I am going to relate to you an unjust act again a person who was doing her job. On the night of September 21, 1995 a Prince George's County Police Officer by the name of Cpl. Stephanie Mohr was working the night shift with her K-9, Valk. Cpl. Mohr was patrolling the area of Takoma Park Maryland. This area had been experiencing numerous complaints about burglaries. Cpl. Mohr was working with a partner by the name of Sergeant Anthony Delozier. The two Police Officers received a call to back up an officer who had spotted two men on a roof of a nearby building.

There was much confusion when the two officers arrived on the scene. Two suspects who were on the roof were ordered down but instead they began arguing amongst themselves in Spanish.

One of the suspects attempted to flee the scene and in accordance to police guidelines Cpl. Mohr released her dog. Police dogs are trained to "bite and hold" which the police dog did. The suspect surrendered and did not try to escape again. The suspect was handcuffed and transported to a police facility. The suspect was charged with 4th degree burglary. The suspect was identified as Herrera Cruz. Cruz pled guilty and was deported to Mexico. The second suspect was identified as Ricardo Mendez. Mendez was convicted of illegally entering the United States and selling crack cocaine and was deported to El Salvador.

So now you have two convicted criminals deported out of the country and an officer who did her job. Did she get a commendation? No. Did she get any kind of recognition? No. Instead five years later the US Department of Justice announced that it would indict Cpl. Mohr for civil rights violations for letting her dog bite CRIMINAL Menedez.

Now you have charges against an officer who was doing her job by apprehending two criminals who had been convicted before and brought back to this country to testify against her for civil rights violations. Does this ring a bell? Do you remember the names of Ignacio Ramos and Jose Compean? They were Border Patrol Agents who were doing their jobs and took appropriate police actions but were charged under the civil rights laws. They also had a criminal who was charged many times for criminal activity testify against them. He too was brought back to the U.S. at government expense to testify again these agents. They were convicted and sent to jail. But unlike Stephanie Mohr they were pardoned by President Bush.

Cpl. Mohr was brought to trial before her peers and the jury voted 11-1 to acquit her. The Justice Department was not happy with this outcome and decided to try her again. This time there were

witnesses who didn't show at the first trial who said that Cpl. Mohr used racial language against the two criminals. Cpl. Mohr was convicted and sentenced to ten years in jail. One can only wonder how racial language got introduced as Cpl. Mohr did not speak Spanish and the two suspects did not speak English.

Adding to the injustice, of this overreaching of the Department of Justice was the fact that she was not indicted until September 20, 2000-one day before the statute of limitation expired and five years after the incident. The incident took place September 21, 1995.

There were other police officers who were involved in this case. All three were found not guilty. Cpl. Mohr received ten years in jail, which is two times the national average for conviction of similar charges. The officers in the Rodney King case received three years in jail.

Cpl. Mohr was in jail for almost four years before a ruling was made on a post conviction appeal challenge



of her sentence and conviction. Most of these decisions are returned in less than a year.

How many of you officers have arrested criminals for Rape, Robbery, Narcotics and other serious offenses who are released before they serve five years?

Many aspects of this case are troubling. Shouldn't the officials of Prince George's County bear some of the blame? They knew Mohr's dog had bitten a criminal before in the past. Also should her trainers bear some of the responsibility? After all, they trained her and her dog.

Most troubling was the political motivation of the States Attorney for the prosecution of this case.

After losing before a Prince George's County Jury he decided to go to The Justice Department to have her tried for Civil Rights violations while he was running for political office in the state. He used the "Police Brutality" canard as his political platform. He had lost several cases involving Prince George's County Police Officers in the past.

Personally I believe this case is a travesty. Why didn't President Bush commute her sentence? Why haven't Women's groups such as NOW speak out on her behalf? Where do Senators Mikulski, Cardin and Governor O'Malley stand on this issue?

Cpl. Mohr, when convicted, had a three and half year old son by the name of Adam. Adam will almost be fourteen when his mother is released from jail, if she is forced to serve her entire sentence. Adam will miss the years when a child needs his mother most.

This I believe is INJUSTICE. If you agree I urge you to write your representatives.

WASHINGTON, DC — With U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder leading the solemn ritual, the names of 387 law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty were read aloud and formally dedicated on the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial in Washington, DC, Wednesday night during the 21st annual Candlelight Vigil for fallen officers.

Included were 133 officers who died in 2008, plus 254 officers who were killed in

previous years but whose stories had not been previously known or recognized.

"As we dedicate these 387 names to the walls of this Memorial we reflect on the brave men and women who gave their lives to protect our safety and to defend our freedoms," U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder said. "Tonight we hold a vigil, but every day we must be vigilant. So let us bind ourselves together with a new bond of service: to make our country brighter, safer and more hopeful, and in so doing, let us honor the memory of our fallen heroes every day."

Attorney General Holder delivered the keynote address at the vigil. Then, along with Jennifer Thacker, national president of Concerns of Police Survivors, he led the lighting of thousands of candles held high in honor of all of America's fallen law enforcement officers.

"These 387 heroes can now take their rightful place alongside so many other heroes who have one thing in common: they chose to put the safety and protection of others above their own," said Craig W. Floyd, chairman and CEO of the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF). "America is truly blessed to have such a breed of citizen protectors among us, and these men and women will always be honored here at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial."

The Memorial in Judiciary Square now contains the names of 18,661 law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty throughout U.S. history, representing all 50 states, the District of Columbia, U.S. territories, and federal law enforcement and military police agencies.

After increasing sharply in 2007, officer fatalities declined by 27 percent in 2008. The 133 officers killed in the line of duty last year was the lowest annual total since 1960, when there were 127 officer deaths.

The number of officers killed by gunfire declined even more dramatically last year. The 39 officers shot and killed in 2008 represented a reduction of 43 percent from 2007 and was the lowest annual figure since 1956.

For the 11th year in a row, more officers died in traffic-related incidents in 2008 than from gunfire or any other single cause of death. The 71 traffic deaths last year included 44 officers who died in automobile accidents, nine in motorcycle accidents and 18 who were stuck and killed by other vehicles while outside their police vehicles.

Thirty-five states, along with Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands, experienced officer fatalities during 2008. Texas had the most officer deaths, with 14, followed

Four of the Pennsylvania deaths took place in Philadelphia, whose police department lost more officers than any other agency last year. Six federal law enforcement officers also died in the line of duty in 2008.

Dedicated in 1991 by President George H.W. Bush, the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial commemorates the service and sacrifice of America's law enforcement officers. Each May 13, as part of National Police Week, the newly engraved names of officers killed in the line of duty are formally dedicated on the National Memorial during the Candlelight Vigil. An estimated 20,000 people attend the ceremony each year, including surviving family members, friends, law enforcement officers and others.

This year, for the first time, the Candlelight Vigil was streamed live over the Internet through a partnership between the NLEOMF and Officer.com

Policeman Shot in Head by Attacker

A Washington policeman patrolling in old clothes was shot twice in the head and critically wounded yesterday as he struggled with an assailant in the 3200 block of 14th Street N.W.

The policeman, Jerrard Foster Young, 25, of Southeast Washington, a member of the fourth district casual clothes squad, was taken to the Washington Hospital Center where he underwent four hours of emergency surgery.

Charles Franklin Moore, 26, of 1917 Capitol Ave., N.E., was arrested immediately after the 10:30 a.m. shooting and charged with assault with intent to kill.

Deputy Chief Mahlon E. Pitts, Chief of Detectives, said that Young and other policemen had arrested Moore on March 31 on a charge of possession of unregistered ammunition.

Moore had been arrested under the alias of Robert Earl Taylor—had been released on personal bond but had failed (to appear) and a bench warrant was issued, and was still outstanding yesterday morning, Pitts said.

An account of the incident: Young and his partner, Officer Charles H. Brown, left the station at 1351 Nicholson St. About 10 a.m. to begin patrol in the 14th Street and Park Road area.

Shortly after arriving there, they parked their car, Brown went into a nearby waffle shop. Young went into a Woolworth store on 14th Street NW to buy a sympathy card for a relative who was ill.

It is speculated that when Young left the store, on the west side of 14th Street, he may have seen Moore on the eastside.

At about this time, Deputy U.S. Marshal Henry A. McElvane, a retired Washington police detective, was driving north on 14th Street. McElvane said he saw two men struggling and heard three shots.

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Seeing a man with a gun, McElvane told police, he jumped from his auto, ordering the man to drop the weapon and held him until police arrived. The man was identified later as Moore, police said.

The wounded policeman, who joined the force in July, 1968, served in the Army in Vietnam for two years, his superiors said. His mother, Virginia Young, a Philadelphia school teacher, was flown to his bedside yesterday.

Moore was arraigned before a U.S. magistrate and held in lieu \$50,000 bond.

District Policeman Dies of Wounds Suffered April 29; N.E. Man Is Held

Jerrard Foster Young, a 25-year-old metropolitan policeman, died late Friday night of gunshot wounds in the head he suffered April 29 during a struggle with another man. He had never regained consciousness.

Police said yesterday that Charles Franklin Moore, 26, of 1917 Capitol Ave. NE, held in lieu of \$50,000 bond on charges of assault with intent to kill in connection with the incident, would be arraigned before a U.S. magistrate Monday on a homicide charge.

Young was wounded fatally, according to police,

when leaving an F.W. Woolworth store on 14th Street at Park Road NW. Henry A. McElvane, a retired police detective, said he saw Young struggling with a man in front of the store and heard three shots.

McElvane ordered the gunman to drop his weapon and held him until police arrived, they said. Young was taken to Washington Hospital Center, where he died.

Mahlon E. Pitts, deputy police chief, said Moore, the suspect, had been arrested by Young and other officers on March 31 on a charge of possession of unregistered ammunition and had been released on personal recognizance.

When Moore failed to appear for trial on April 6, a warrant for his arrest was issued. It was outstanding at the time of the shooting.

Young, a native of Savannah, Ga., joined the police force in July 1968. He served in the Army in Vietnam for two years and was twice wounded in combat.

Survivors include his mother, Virginia D. Young, a Philadelphia elementary school teacher; his father, Joseph Young, a Savannah businessman, and a brother, Jon A. Young, stationed in California with the Air Force.

More than 1,000 uniformed and plainclothes policemen bade farewell yesterday

to a slain colleague, Officer Jerard Foster Young, at Washington Cathedral. Mayor Walter Washington and Police Chief Jerry V. Wilson led the official mourners for Officer Young. The 25-year-old policeman died Friday at Washington Hospital Center of injuries suffered when he was shot April 29 in the 3200 block of 14th Street NW, apparently during a struggle with a man he had previously arrested Continued on page 44

in connection with another incident.

Inevitably the mourner's thoughts turned also to Officer William L. Sigmon, shot dead here Tuesday during a Savings and Loan robbery who will be buried Friday.

The funeral preacher, the Rev. Paul M. Washington, rector of the Church of the Advocate in Philadelphia and Officer Young's childhood pastor, said of the shootings, "They didn't have to be."

Looking out from the cathedral's Gothic pulpit over the ranks of blue below him, Father Washington asserted that society has placed policemen in a position of almost impossible ambiguity, demanding rigid enforcement of law and order in the ghetto while tolerating illegality in high places.

"You may well have working conditions that are worse than anyone else's," he asserted.

In his sermon, and later in an interview, Father Washington described Officer Young as one who attempted and largely succeeded in the effort to resolve the ambiguities of a policeman's life, to be both an officer of justice and an agent of mercy and understanding.

Officer Young, who joined the metropolitan police in July 1968, was a veteran of two years in Vietnam.

The long funeral cortege wound its way across the city after leaving the cathedral to the sound of tolling bells. After passing 4th district headquarters, at 1351 Nicholson St. NW, where Officer Young was stationed and where an honor guard stood at attention for the passing of the hearse, the procession turned south.

At the burial site at Lincoln Memorial Cemetery, police officers stood at attention, rifles cracked and a bugler played "Taps."

Officer Young's mother had kept nearly a round-the-clock vigil by her son's bedside since the shooting, but he never regained consciousness. She collapsed as the long ceremony ended yesterday, and was carried to a waiting limousine.



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
